Migrants/Refugees Week.

To mark Refugee Week, that runs from 17 – 23 June, Bishop Paul McAleenan, Lead Bishop for Migrants and Refugees for the Bishops' Conference, offers a reflection on three themes – his recent visit to the Bibby Stockholm, the impact of the Rwanda Bill, and societal attitudes towards refugees and migrants.

In late April, Bishop McAleenan was invited by the Home Office to visit Bibby Stockholm. The vessel is a large floating barge moored off Portland Harbour in Dorset that accommodates asylum seekers – many who have fled torture and persecution.

The visit offered a chance to meet with residents, reflect on their plight and consider the pastoral care we could offer. At the time of the visit, Bibby Stockholm housed over three hundred asylum seekers, but numbers fluctuate depending on departures and arrivals.
